world, terrorizing their human residents. Though shocking, the threat is quickly neutralized when the animals are killed en masse for the safety of humanity. In the post-fauna world, Jenlena is transformed, shaking off her characteristic passivity to capitalize on other people's heartbreak and grief by selling plants that have come to replace pets, and impersonating dogs for pay. Conversely, Daphne, a once-promising student, flounders in a deep depression, smoking weed and slacking off at work to hang out with her canceled boyfriend.

Meanwhile, in California, the billionaire Roderick Maeve is paranoid, insecure, and listless after his most recent divorce. Desperate for public approval, he enlists a boy-genius to build a time machine that will return this chaotic world back to normal. When news of his plans breaks, Daphne is ecstatic, relieved that the world will be put to rights, restoring the possibility of the upper middle-class life she's always felt was promised to her, while Jenlena worries about what to do now that her newfound entrepreneurial ventures will no longer have value. Through a chance meeting at a hotel in downtown Montreal, Jenlena meets Maeve himself, and the two become romantically entangled; a relationship that will expose her to a new understanding of wealth, power, and what change really means. As the launch of the time machine nears and the Moon Bethlehems grow in number and influence, the world hurtles toward what might be destruction disguised as salvation, or perhaps the other way around.

Satirical, wry, and utterly original, MOOD SWINGS imagines with pitch-perfect absurdity what comes after life as we know it.

HENRY HENRY is a re-imagining of Shakespeare's *Henriad* that transposes the legend of Henry V's wayward youth into 21st century London in the years leading up to the Brexit referendum, following 22-year-old Hal Lancaster, the reluctant heir of his father Henry, the sixteenth Duke of Lancaster.

Hal Lancaster—gay, Catholic, chainsmoker, chops lines of cocaine with his myWaitrose card—spends his first post-Oxford year in London floating between internship placements, drinking sessions with his mates Jack and Poins, awkward hookups, and occasionally attending mass to absolve himself of his many sins. Hal makes every effort to dodge his

five siblings and widowed father Henry, a tormented true believer whose investment in his son and heir is proving less and less promising by the day. When Henry announces his intent on remarrying to help bolster the family's winnowing finances, there is hope that his frustrated attentions will move to his bride-to-be. Instead, the more Hal acts out, the more desperate and obsessive his father's attempts to control him become. It doesn't help that Henry views Hal's vice-ridden lifestyle as an emulation of his resented cousin Richard who held the title before his untimely death from AIDS, leaving it to Henry.

When a grouse shooting accident—funny in retrospect—makes a romance out of Hal's rivalry with fumblingly leftist and decidedly career-oriented family friend Harry Percy, his profligate ways begin to fade into the background. Hal finds that he wants, for the first time, to be himself. But Henry is an Englishman: he will not let his son escape tradition. He keeps Hal in line with passive-aggression, religious guilt, and a kind of violence that could almost be confused for tenderness. Before Hal can truly come into his own, he must confront not just his buried grief and mounting shame, but also the secret that has kept him stunted all along.


While Shakespeare buffs will appreciate this recasting, HENRY HENRY will also appeal to readers of the Patrick Melrose novels for its dark humor, dissection of the English upper class, and creeping undercurrent of trauma. It similarly calls to mind Hanya Yanagihara's *A Little Life* in its exploration of what hidden abuses cause when left unaddressed. Channeling the works of André Aciman and Garth Greenwell, the novel is a startling meditation on the mystifying depths and contradictions of desire, shame, and intimacy.



Allen Bratton is a queer writer and artist currently living between the US, Canada, and Ireland. He earned his BA at New York University where he was selected for the Creative Writing department's Master Class in Fiction taught by Colson Whitehead. Allen went on to earn an MA in English from the University of British Columbia, completing a thesis on kings Edward II and Richard II while beginning work on HENRY HENRY. An earlier version of the novel was on the longlist for the 2021 Deborah Rogers Foundation Writers Award judged by Colm Tóibín, Deepa Anappara, Anna James, and Ingrid Persaud. His short story, "Philippa," which extends from a minor character in HENRY HENRY, was selected by Brandon Taylor as the winner for the 2021 Sewanee Review fiction contest. Taylor called it "a strange, dark story powered by a crepuscular psychological acuity and sharp dialogue...A potent, memorable story from a startling talent."

Three obstacles stand in the way of Garrett's ambitions: the cannery owner's sycophantic nephew whose mere presence threatens Garrett's position, rising tension between cannery supervisors and the foreign workforce, and Garrett's spiraling mental health, which has led him to believe he's found a human leg bone on the beach, haunting him at every turn, and reminding him that his father's death may very well not have been an accident.

In spite of his deep-seated cynicism, Garrett befriends a secretive older woman who mends nets, a young Turkish entrepreneur, and a new-agey Canadian with famed anthropologist parents. Through these three, Garrett finds himself unexpectedly drawn toward new ways of living. But as the grueling cannery hours tick by and mysterious acts of vandalism begin, Garrett's sense of reality begins to shift below his feet. Are his coworkers conspiring against him? Can he trust the things he sees? Has the Net Lady been playing tricks on him? Women are encouraged to view marriage and motherhood as the pinnacle of success. Although Amanda Montei understood motherhood wouldn't lead automatically to fulfillment, even she found the narrative hard to resist. After giving birth—and even during pregnancy—Amanda struggled to adjust to the new demands on her physical body.

Structural conditions—the lack of paid leave, the childcare crisis, mothers as America's only social safety net—were depriving Amanda of her bodily autonomy, but without another outlet for rebellion, she found agency by rejecting intimacy with her children and husband. Amanda struggled with the physicality of caring for children, but even more with her growing awareness that the lack of bodily autonomy she felt in motherhood reiterated a feeling she had always had about her body; she had been taught to use it to please others, especially men, without necessarily considering whether she wanted to.

Amanda was not alone—she found a huge assortment of women online who described feeling "touched out" too. Women are supposed to care for and pleasure their husbands and children, and to do so by pushing their bodies to the limit, ignoring their own desires and needs. Motherhood, too, can feel like an assault. And just as we naturalize sexual violence against women, we have also come to normalize the suffering of mothers.

The author writes with a blend of emotion drawn from personal experience and power drawn from her academic background and a lifetime of engaging with feminist thinkers and writers from Chanel Miller and Kate Manne to bell hooks, Audre Lorde, Silvia Federici and Adrienne Rich. She draws a unique connection between rape culture and the bodily sacrifices women are expected to make for their children, making a powerful argument from a thoughtful and considered perspective.

Ultimately, TOUCHED OUT prescribes a path forward for caregivers to take back their bodies, pass on a language of consent, and write a new story about what it means to care in America.



But is this true? 

Along the way she falls deeply in love with an exotic boy with a mysterious past and a painful secret. The truth about him emerges just as Becca's own true purpose emerges.

In the new book five, the stories of the series' main characters come to a close. Hannah Armstrong finally learns the truth of why she was left by her mother and she learns to control her powers. Seth Darrow learns to trust the girl of his dreams, a recovering addict. Derric Mathieson develops a deeper connection to his African heritage when he takes part in a non-profit that puts wells into villages in Africa. Jenn McDaniels learns a lesson in commitment after the betrayal of her partner Cynthia.
